Egyptian Apparel Factories Produce Ethical And Sustainable Products



The Egyptian Cotton trademark

- Egyptian factories manufacture various products out of 100% Organic cotton or linen.
- 129 Egyptian Manufacturers are licensed to use the Egyptian Cotton Logo meeting high standards of 100% pure Egyptian Cotton, which is the finest Cotton in the world. This logo guarantees clients it is genuine Cotton grown exclusively in Egypt and manually harvested.

The Global Organic Textile Standard

- **26** Egyptian Factories are certified to the Global Organic Textile Standard (GOTS) which covers processing, manufacturing, packaging, labelling, and trading.
- It is the stringent voluntary global standard for the entire post-harvest processing, which includes both environmental and social criteria.
- Key provisions of GOTS include a ban on the use of genetically modified organisms (GMOs), highly hazardous chemicals (such as azo dyes and formaldehyde), and child labor, while requiring strong social compliance management systems and strict waste water treatment practices.

The Egyptian Cotton Project led by UNIDO Egypt aims to enhance the sustainability, inclusiveness & value addition of the cotton value chain by developing the economic, social and environmental performance of cotton manufacturers and support institutions.

The Better Cotton Initiative (BCI)



- The largest cotton sustainability program in the world jointly coordinated by UNIDO.
- BCI focused on promoting a more sustainable way of growing cotton and has developed a Better Cotton Standard System



- Egypt launched the Better Cotton Initiative (BCI) pilot in the country to support the Egyptian Cotton branding, aiming at increase product sustainability, improve working conditions along the supply chain, and support cotton growers and relevant institutions in paving the way towards the pilot's national up scaling.
- The project's vision is to pilot the BCI standard system in Egypt to advance the cotton industry in a way that cares for the environment and the farmers growing it, through a multi-stakeholder program.





The Cotton Museum, traces the history of cotton in Egypt and the world. On display are manuscripts and legislative decrees on cotton, antique embroidered fabrics, illustrations, information and samples of all botanical varieties in the world, from the extinct to the most recent.



Recycling pilot Project for Denim scraps



Circularity and High Value Recycling

Global trends towards recycling of textiles is growing rapidly to avoid the negative effects on the environment and face the scarcity of raw materials, Egypt is working with one of the UN agencies (UNIDO) in launching a recycling pilot Project for Denim scraps.

Pilot Process

This pilot will relate to operational trials of high value recycling by transforming denim scraps into yarns for ring spinning and weaving, through recycling denim textile waste into yarns for the production of new garment products. The recycled yarns and textiles will be then used for the development of capsule collections by young fashion designers.






